# Our Speci

e have long been discussing ways in which we can enlarge the scope of our rural programs and effectively teach alternatives to habitat destruction and the use of toxic chemicals on land that impacts on wildlife. It is commonly known that the imprudent use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides drains into the watershed that feeds the vast plains of East Africa which wildlife inhabits. In some areas lions have been found dead from eating animals that grazed on grasses fed by contaminated water resources.

Cheap pesticides and fertilizers imported from China have no 'clear' instructions and there have been noticeable changes since those chemicals hit the market in rural areas. When the soil of farm land is over-exploited or rendered unproductive by excessive use of chemicals, the only alternative is to develop another piece of land, thus encroaching on the areas where wildlife roamed freely without human animal conflict. How to salvage what has become large areas of unusable land is what our project addresses. It also encompasses our ever-growing concern for the quality of the produce available for human consumption.

We are beginning by establishing a pilot organic farm at our Education Centre and the initial construction is almost completed. It is a shade net tunnel that replicates a green house. More to come ....

## Nyariginu

In 1993 I was given a very great present from dear and generous friends, Lillian and Jon Lovelace. The present was a rural library at a school of my choosing; the school I chose was Nyariginu Primary School.

On a recent visit to Nyariginu I was saddened to see that the so-called 'kitchen' was falling down- the building was dangerous and the cooking facility was unsanitary. Through the efforts of our Secretary / Treasurer Kathy Bartels and the generosity of over 100 donors, enough money has been raised so far to cover half the budget of a new sustainable kitchen and canteen. The funds were raised by the sale of a 2017 calendar designed by Kathy as a birthday surprise to me. It was quite a surprise indeed!

Thank you to those who have so far donated by purchasing a calendar and to those who are yet to participate.







## Wathituga

For many years Wathituga has been our flagship rural library where the effects of our enhancements along with our visits by the education team headed by Michael Ng'ang'a have had extraordinary results. This school has continued to excel in scholastic competitions throughout the district and has proven itself worthy of all the help we have given them.







A few years ago we took down a building containing two classrooms and replaced it with a solid structure that greatly enhances the school facilities. Next to this building is now a condemned structure that threatens the safety of students and teachers as well as the new building we built adjacent to it.

Because of the instability of the soil, which is called black cotton, it is necessary to employ a new building technique involving a prefabricated concrete slab. This method should prevent the floor from cracking and just happens to be a bit less costly than conventional methods.



This new building is generously donated by Ann Moss and Rodney Gould, both of whom serve on our Advisory Board. Wathituga will never forget you. Thank you on their behalf and mine. - SP

## News From Kenya




