



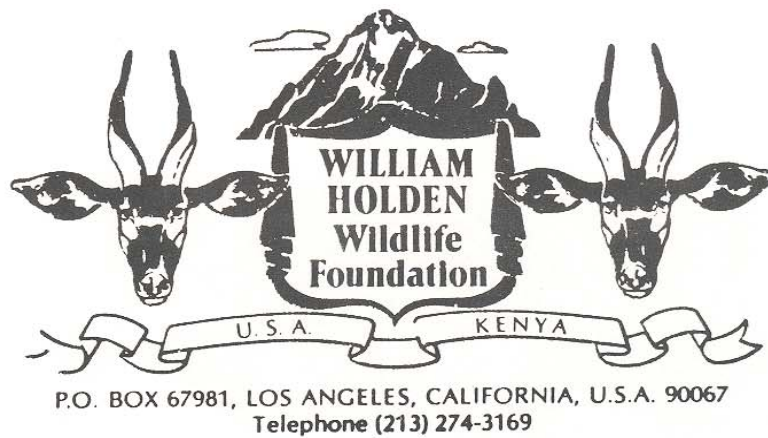


I am sure the next few years will bring meritorious contributions from Mr. Vermey and Mr. Munai, and we all look forward to working together.

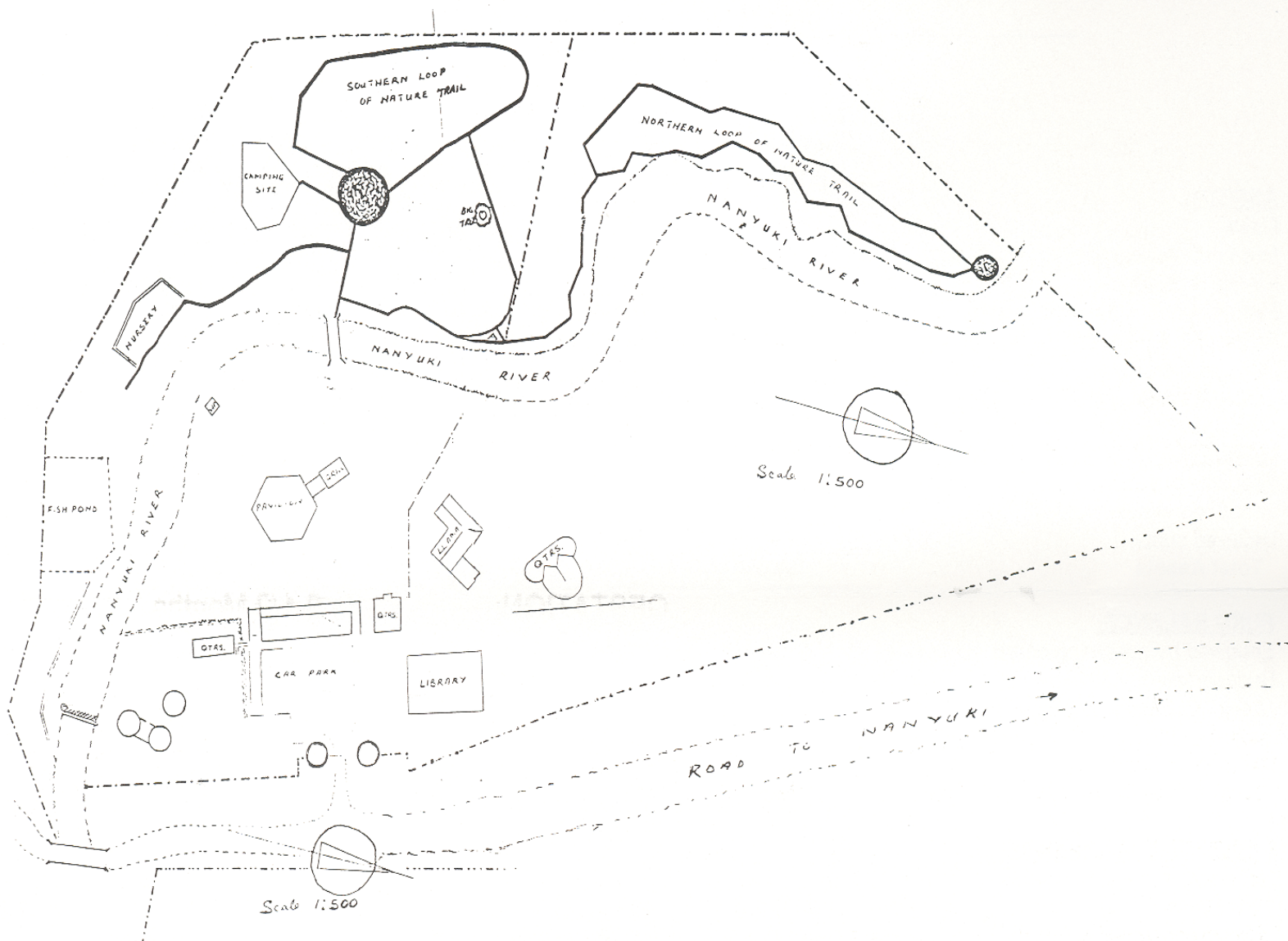

CHEETAH



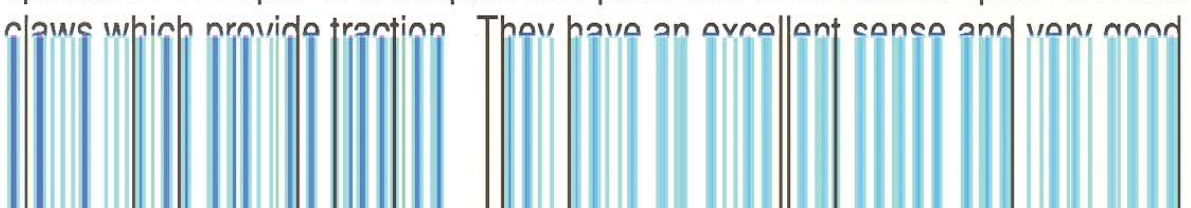

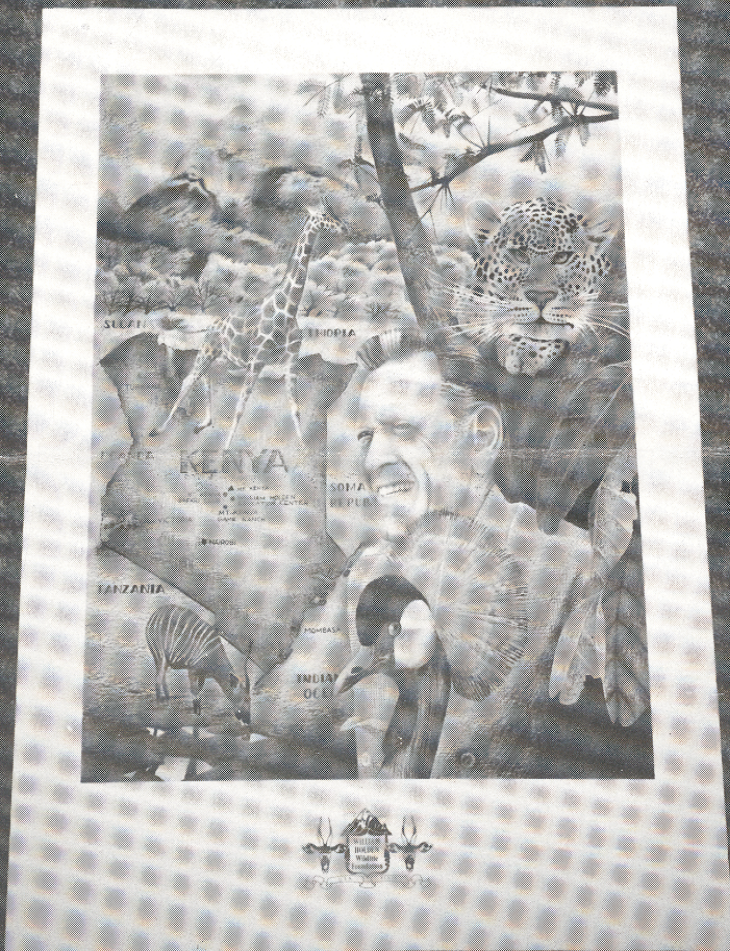
DESCRIPTION: A large sized cat with a thin body and long, slender legs. Body a yellowish brown colour covered with black spots. The head is rounded with small round ears and a black stripe running from the corner of the eye to the mouth. The Cheetah has a long tail with several rings on the end of a white tip.

FEEDING: The Cheetah feeds on a wide variety of mammals and birds from hares to antelope and will even hunt larger mammals, e.g. zebra, when in family groups.

HABITAT: Open grasslands, savannah and dry bush country. Formerly found widely distributed in Africa and India. Today the Cheetah is found only in portions of Africa south of Sahara, East and South Central Africa.

BEHAVIOUR: Cheetah are active during the day and hunt in the early morning or late evening. Normally live alone or in small family groups. Characterized by its ability to run at speeds of 110 kph. It is adapted for speed due to its flexible spine and extended claws which provide traction. They have an excellent sense and very good
