Following the Summit on the Environment in Rio de Janeiro, the symposium, the first in Africa, will put in place plans to safeguard the African continent for future generations. It will be attended by Heads of States, Government Ministers, U.S. and international tourism professionals and wildlife and conservation groups. Clearly tourism has an effect on the preservation of species and an enormous impact on the positive efforts of conservation. The income from tourism attracted by the wildlife has drastically been affected by the recession and the political upheavals in some African countries. The motivation for preservation may not be a pure one but anything that does the job can only be desirous. If it takes tourism to encourage governments to actively prevent destruction of flora and fauna then so be it. We feel James will have a very interesting report for us in our next newsletter.


It is only fair that we should give equal time to some of our younger contributors. . . The California School for the Deaf have been among our greatest supporters, here are some thoughts from one of their students. . .

ROLE PLAYING HELPS STUDENTS

We all know what natural actors children are, so James Vermey, our education officer, came up with an ingenious method of bringing home the lesson of how complex it is to convert an entire society to a new and more environmentally responsible way of life. The Rio conference proved that not even our great world leaders can come to a comprehensive unilateral accord on saving the planet, perhaps they could benefit from some role playing themselves.

The exercise is conducted by creating teams of two in each category defending the position of the role they are given in a panel debate on the question of whether or not "all national parks and game reserves should be turned over to landless people". Keep in mind that Kenya is a country with a population of nearly 27 million and as many as 50% of those 27 Million are under the age of 19.

WILDLIFE:

You are a rhino and are respected by all the animals. Your numbers are very low - as are the numbers of most animals. Over the years people have been settling on your land and now there are very few places remaining where you can live. If these places (parks and reserves) are settled, you will have no place to live.

GAME WARDEN: MR. MAKEBA



You are a game warden and have worked in national parks 20 years. You understand the importance of wildlife in preserving natural ecosystem and providing foreign exchange. If parks are turned over to landless people, the animals will be killed and you will be out of a job.

CONSERVATIONIST: MISS WACHIRA



You are familiar with the destructive effects of large numbers of people and cultivation on natural ecosystems. You have worked on many projects to save wildlife from destruction. Through your activities forests, wet-lands and many animals have been preserved. If the parks are turned over to landless people the land will shortly be turned into farmland and the habitats of animals and plants will be destroyed.

CONTRACTOR: MR. KARIUKI



There is much competition for construction jobs in Nairobi and other big towns. You have 300 employees who need work. If parks were turned over to landless people there would be many contracts available as homes, schools, hospitals and offices would need to be built. Wildlife means nothing to you and you do not see that it has any importance.

LANDLESS PERSON: MRS. MWANGI



You do not own any land and you have children all of whom need food, clothes, school fees and a home. Your husband works as a casual laborer and sends what he can to help pay rent for your house in town. You make and sell baskets but it is not enough to pay for all of your needs. If you had land you could grow the food you need for your children and also to sell. The money your husband makes could be used for clothes and school fees.

MERCHANT:

You own a chain of hardware stores throughout the country. Business has been slow in some areas and your business will close if you do not receive any orders. Development of new housing estates etc. would be very helpful at this time.
